## **Resource: Persuasive Writing Prompts and Rubric**

### **Grade Level: Middle and High School**

#### **Persuasive Writing Prompts**

Persuasive writing argues a point, expresses an opinion, and tries to convince the reader to 'join one's side.' Good persuasive writing includes:

- A stated opinion or arguable point
- Facts
- Sound, specific reasons
- Strong examples to support the case
- Opposing viewpoints with strong rebuttal
- A conclusion reiterating the writer's opinion/argument

The following writing prompts support SEL topics and require all the elements of good persuasive writing:

- Agree or disagree: television violence promotes social violence.
- What cause do you support? In what cause do you actively participate? Write an essay convincing readers to support a cause.
- Convince a reader to become a regular volunteer for an organization.
- Agree or disagree: Americans are addicted to their screen devices.
- Develop an argument for or against a school's right to search your locker for drugs and/or weapons at any time.
- Convince readers to take on a specific habit that will benefit their physical, emotional, or financial health.
- Does texting help people communicate better or is it destroying our abilities to write and carry on conversations with others? Explain and support your position.
- Write an essay describing what students should do to be successful in life.
- Do professional athletes deserve high salaries and bonuses? Explain and support your position.
- Agree or disagree: The United States of America is the best country in the world.
- What is your school's policy on gender specific bathrooms and locker rooms? Where do you stand on this policy?
- Many adults feel that young people no longer feel or exhibit empathy.
- Many people believe that honesty is the best policy. In your opinion, is it ever okay to lie?
- Is a good education a right or a privilege? Why?
- People should be given the opportunity to fail.

<b>Organization</b>	Writing has compelling opening, and informative body, and a satisfying conclusion. There is a clear thesis statement.	Writing is organized but opening, body, or conclusion might be missing or is unclear. There is a thesis statement.	Writing is somewhat organized, but sometimes is off topic. May be missing opening, body, or conclusion and/or there is no clear thesis statement.	Writing is aimless and disorganized. There is no clear thesis statement.
